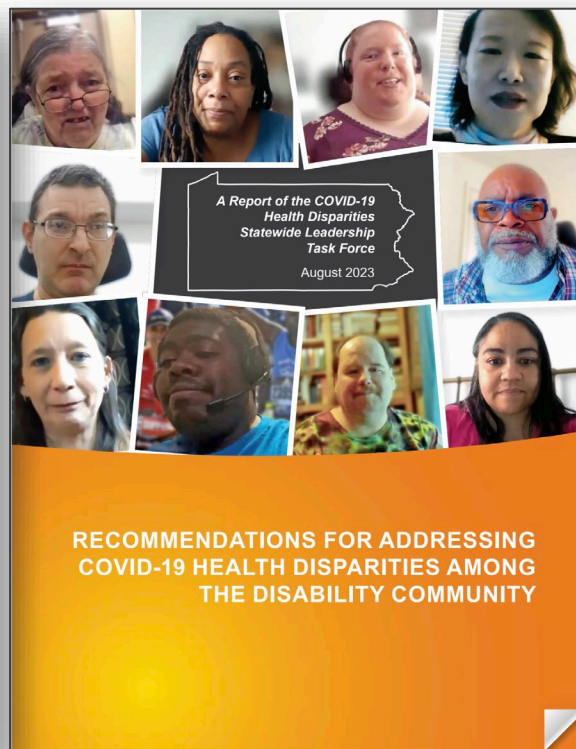
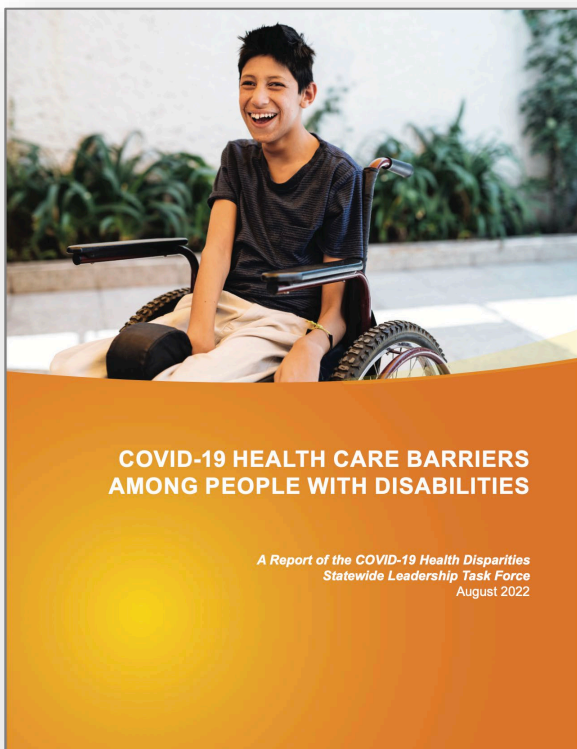

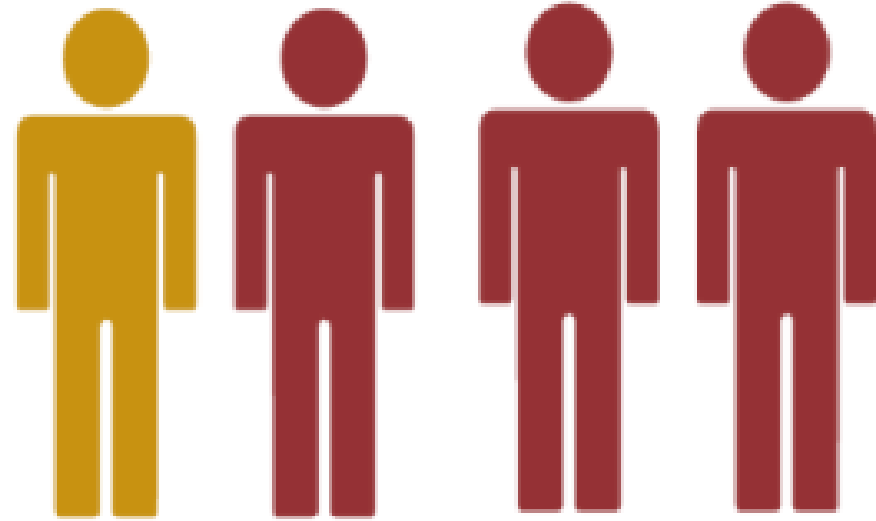

Health Inequities

- **3 X** "Adults with disabilities are three times more likely to have heart disease, stroke, diabetes, or cancer than adults without disabilities." [4](#) - Carroll et al, 2014
- "Health inequities arise from unfair conditions faced by persons with disabilities, including stigma, discrimination, poverty, limited education and employment, transportation barriers, and barriers faced in the health system itself." - WHO, 2023



2021-2022 Listening Tour: COVID-19 Health Care Strengths and Barriers



Diversity by role

- Mostly persons with lived experience of disability, caretakers and family members
- Also, professionals in the fields of disability and health care

Diversity by disability – intentional outreach across physical, intellectual developmental, behavioral, or emotional, sensory impairment, and complex medical disabilities

Diversity by race – intentional outreach to Black Indigenous People of Color (BIPOC)

Diversity by location – rural, urban, suburban; intentional outreach to rural settings

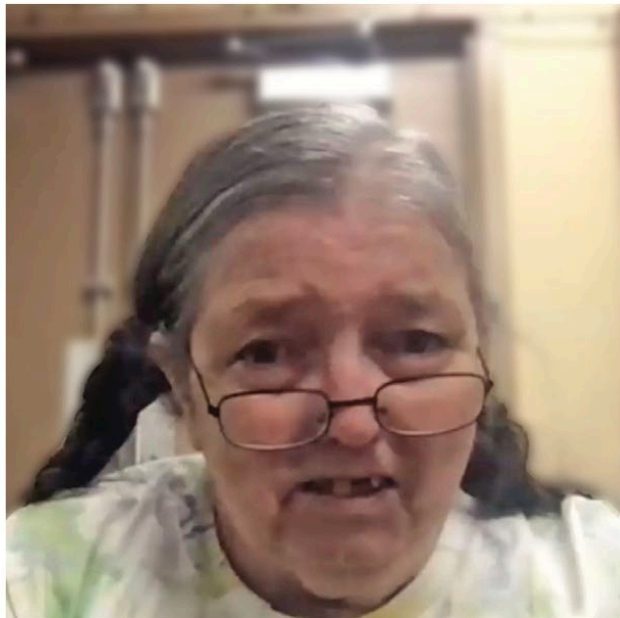

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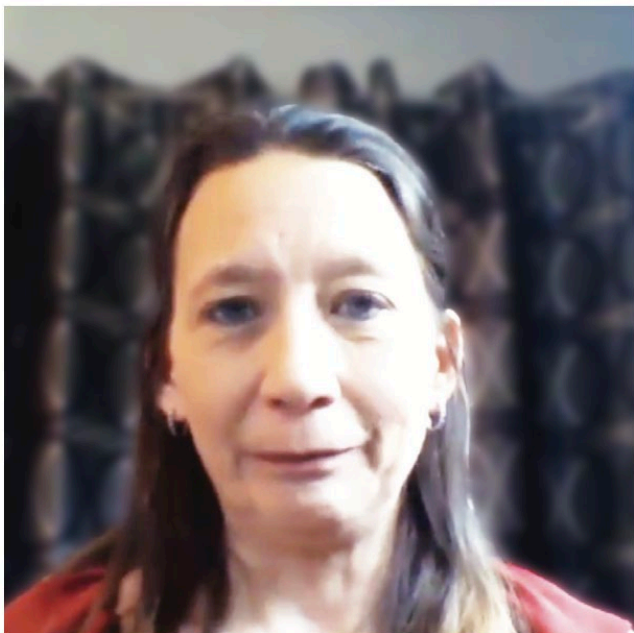

Recommendations:

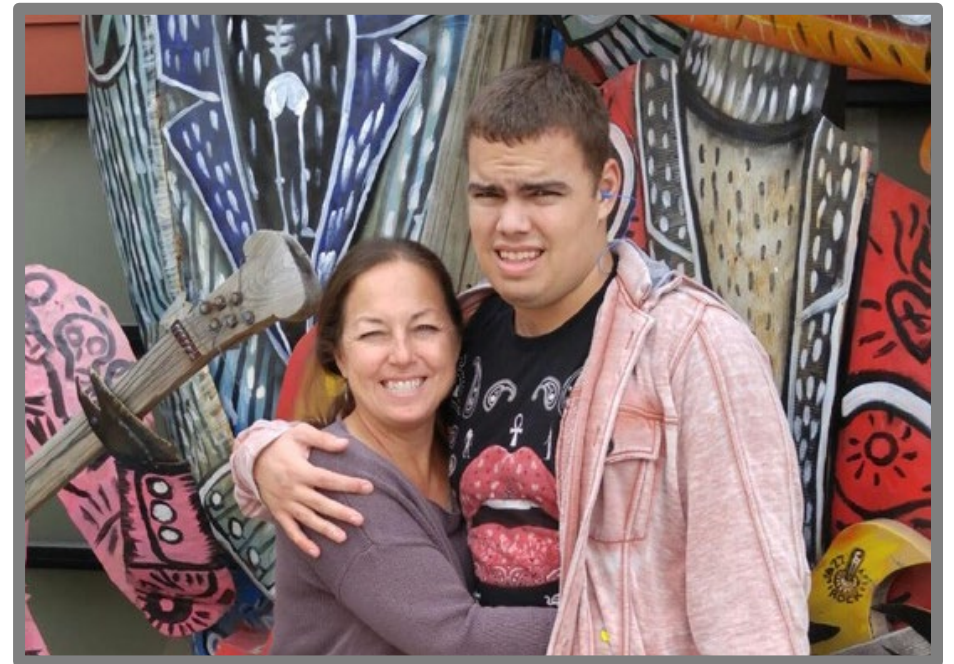
- Involve people with disabilities, their families, and caregivers making and healthcare decisions.
- Increase accessibility of health care.
- Provide information in multiple languages, easy-to-understand and easy to access formats.
- Expand community-based healthcare, including telehealth services and mobile clinics.
- Provide disability-specific training for healthcare professionals.
- Collect standardized data on the health needs of people with disabilities.

Disparities Impact Statement



This tool can be used by all health care stakeholders to achieve health equity for racial and ethnic minorities, people with disabilities, sexual and gender minorities, individuals with limited English proficiency, and rural populations.

This worksheet has 5 steps:

- 1 Identify health disparities and priority populations
- 2 Define your goals
- 3 Establish your organization's health equity strategy
- 4 Determine what your organization needs to implement its strategy
- 5 Monitor and evaluate your progress

Health disparities—differences in health outcomes closely linked with social, economic, and environmental disadvantage—are often driven by the social conditions in which individuals live, learn, work, and play.



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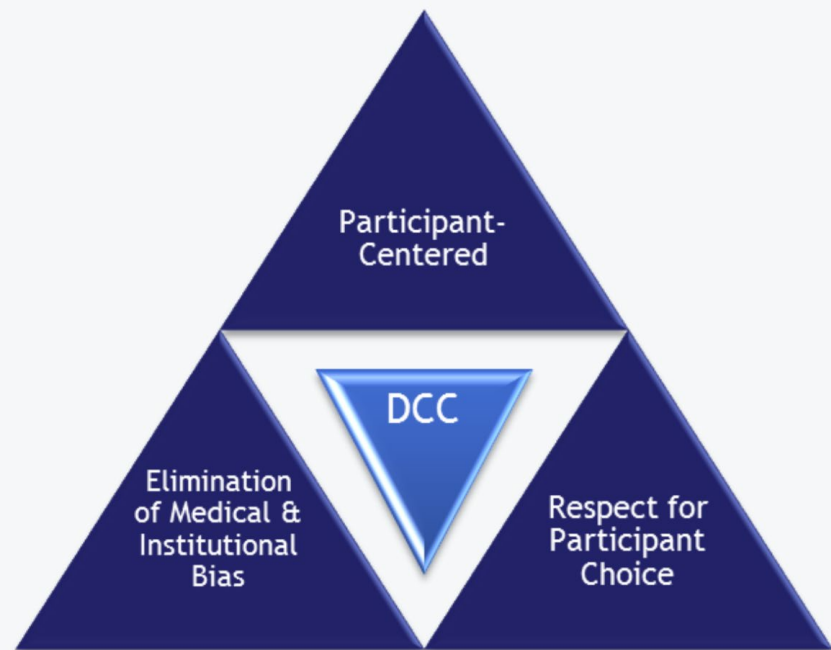
